Program Description

The Law Enforcement Transfer Pathway AS offers students a powerful option: the opportunity to complete an Associate of Science degree with course credits that directly transfer to designated Law Enforcement bachelor's degree programs at Minnesota State universities. The curriculum has been specifically designed so that students completing this pathway degree and transferring to one of the seven Minnesota State universities enter the university with junior-year status. All courses in the Transfer Pathway associate degree will directly transfer and apply to the designated bachelor's degree programs in a related field.

Universities within the Minnesota State system include Bemidji State University; Metropolitan State University; Minnesota State University, Mankato; Minnesota State University Moorhead; Southwest Minnesota State University; St. Cloud State University; and Winona State University.

Occupational Titles

This program prepares students to take the Minnesota Peace Officer Standards and Training (P.O.S.T.) exam and start careers in state, municipal, and county law enforcement agencies, as well as State and Federal government agencies.

Program Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of the Hibbing Community College Law Enforcement diploma program, the graduate will have:

- Completed certification as an Emergency Medical Responder.
- Demonstrated a proficiency in all aspects of Firearms.
- Demonstrated a proficiency in all aspects of Defensive Tactics.
- Demonstrated a proficiency in all aspects of Traffic Enforcement.
- Demonstrated a proficiency in all aspects of Crime Scene Processing.
- Demonstrated, through reality based practical training scenarios, a proficiency in all aspects of Police Operations.
- Met all Minnesota Peace Officer Standards and Training Board criteria to obtain a degree in Law Enforcement.
- Demonstrated effective writing, speaking, and listening skills.
- Demonstrated knowledge of behaviors and interactions among individuals, societal groups, and institutions.
