

## **Minnesota North College Student Right-To-Know Graduation and Transfer-Out Rates**

### **What is Student Right-To-Know?**

Student Right-To-Know is a federal law that requires all colleges and universities to disclose certain information to students. This handout provides the information that a college must provide to students on graduation rates and transfer-out rates for full-time students seeking degrees at Minnesota North College (MNC).

### **What is a graduation rate and what is a transfer-out rate?**

Federal regulations specify how to calculate the graduation and transfer rates. The rates come from a study of Minnesota North College students who started at the college in the fall of 2019. The study includes all first-time students who enrolled full-time that fall and were seeking to earn a degree, diploma or certificate at the college. The **graduation rate** is the percentage of these students who graduated from MNC within three years. The **transfer-out rate** is the percentage of these students who did not graduate from MNC, but instead transferred to another college or university within three years.

### **What do I need to know about these rates?**

These rates do not report on all students at Minnesota North College. The 712 first-time, full-time students in the study were 18 percent of all students enrolled at MNC in fall of 2019.

### **What are the graduation and transfer-out rates for Minnesota North College students and how do they compare to rates for other colleges?**

- The **graduation rate** for MNC was 36 percent.
- The **transfer-out rate** for MNC was 18 percent.
- The combination of the graduation rate and the transfer-out rate for MNC was 54 percent. The national average combined rate for similar colleges was 44 percent.

### **Why don't more Minnesota North College students graduate or transfer in three years?**

- Since MNC has an “open door” mission, many new students need to take “developmental” courses to improve their reading, writing or math skills before taking other college courses;
- Students who switch from full-time to part-time enrollment or “stop out” for one or more semesters are more likely to take more than three years to graduate;
- Some students take jobs before they graduate;
- Other students delay their education for personal, family or financial reasons.
